Selections for the Nutcracker Ballet

by Peter Tchaikovsky (1840-1893); arr. Merle Isaac

March of the Nutcracker Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy Waltz of the Flowers Trepak

Although the original production was not a success, the 20-minute suite that Tchaikovsky extracted from the ballet was. Tchaikovsky's score has become one of his most famous compositions, in particular the pieces featured in the suite. "Trepak" is one of the several consecutive ethnic dances in The Nutcracker and based on the traditional Ukrainian folk dance known in Ukrainian as the Tropak or Tripak.

A Vaughan Williams Christmas; arr. Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958)
Forest Green / Wassail Song / Sussex Carol

Three cherished Ralph Vaughan Williams carols are incorporated into this lovely medley and are all from his native England.

In The Bleak Midwinter by Gustav Hoist (1874-1934); arr. by Robert W. Smith

Christmas carol based on a poem by the English poet Christina Rossetti. In verse one, she describes the Incarnation in Bethlehem. In verse two, she contrasts Christ's first and second coming. A third verse dwells on Christ's birth, the fourth provides another contrast between the incorporeal angels attendant at Christ's birth with Mary's ability to render Jesus physical affection. The final verse shifts the description to a more introspective thought process.

The First Noel; arr. by Ric Rauding

The First Noel is a traditional classical English Christmas carol, most likely from the early modern period, although possibly earlier. Noel is an Early Modern English synonym of "Christmas" and is of Cornish origin. Its current form was published in "Carols Ancient and Modern" in 1823.

Duet by Michael Jones (English Horn) and Elizabeth Boulter (Recorder) Carol of the Bells by Mykola Leontovych (1877-1921) Wexford Carol arr. by Daniel Kelly

"Carol of the Bells" is a popular Christmas carol is based on a Ukrainian folk chant called "Shchedryk" know in English as The Little Swallow. "The Wexford Carol", sometimes known by its first verse "Good people all this Christmas time", is one of the oldest extant Christmas carols in the European tradition and likely came from Irish music during the late 18th and through the entire 19th century.

Santa Claus is Coming to Town

"I'll Be Home for Christmas" was recorded in 1943 by Bing Crosby, who scored a top ten hit with the song and was originally written to honor soldiers overseas who longed to be home at Christmastime. "Frosty the Snowman" was written by Walter "Jack" Rollins and Steve Nelson, and first recorded by Gene Autry and the Cass County Boys in 1950. "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas", a song written by Hugh Martin and Ralph Blane, was introduced by Judy Garland in the 1944 MGM musical "Meet Me in St. Louis". "Santa Claus is Coming to Town" was written by John Frederick Coots and Haven Gillespie and was first sung on Eddie Cantor's radio show in November 1934.

Sleigh Ride by Leroy Anderson (1908-1975)

"Sleigh Ride" is a popular light orchestra standard composed by Leroy Anderson. The composer had the original idea for the piece during a heat wave in July 1946 and finished the work in February 1948.

O Come All Ye Faithful / Hark! The Herald Angels Sing

O Come All Ye Faithful was originally written in Latin as Adeste Fideles. Besides John Francis Wade, the tune has been purported to be written by musicians—John Reading and his son to Handel and even Gluck, including two Portuguese composers Marcos Portugal or the king John IV of Portugal. "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" is a Christmas carol that first appeared in 1739 in the collection Hymns and Sacred Poems. Its lyrics had been written by Charles Wesley.
